DIRECTIONS TO GOLF COURSES

Apr. 6 <u>Buffalo Creek</u> (Heath) 972-771-4003; 624 Country Club Dr. Drive the George Bush Turnpike east/south (it ends at I-30). Merge onto I-30 <u>east</u>. Go across lake, exit at Horizon Rd. Turn right, drive across Ridge Rd. (traffic light). Immediately past hospital, turn right onto Tubbs Rd. (7-11 store on left). Road changes name to White Rd. as it winds through residential area paralleling golf course. At the stop sign (Country Club Rd.) turn left. Drive ¼ mile, course entrance on right.

Apr. 13 <u>Bridlewood</u> (Flower Mound) 972-355-4800; 4000 W. Windsor Dr. Proceed north on I-35E, exit at FM1171/Main St. (Lewisville). Turn left (west), drive 5 ½ miles, right turn at Bridlewood Blvd. At 1st stop sign, turn right, course entrance on left.

Apr. 18 <u>Diamond Oaks C.C.</u> (Ft. Worth) 817-834-6261; 5821 Diamond Oaks Dr. N. Drive the George Bush Turnpike south, merging onto Hwy 183 west. Drive 15 miles west. Hwy 183 becomes I-820 west. Past Iron Horse Blvd., exit at Hwy 377 (Denton Hwy). Turn left and drive south on Hwy 377 for 1 mile. Turn left at Diamond Oaks Dr. Road bends to the right, Club entrance is on left.

Apr. 20 <u>Texas Star</u> (Euless) 817-685-7888; 1400 Texas Star Pkwy. Take Hwy 183 (Airport Frwy) west, past the south entrance to DFW Airport. Exit at Hwy 10 West (it becomes Euless Blvd.) Continue on Hwy 10, passing Hwy 157 (Industrial Blvd.) for 1 more mile. Course entrance on left.

Apr. 27 Fossil Creek (Ft. Worth) 817-847-1900; 3401 Clubgate Dr. Drive Hwy 183 W, transition to 820 W., exit at North Beach, Right turn. Drive to 3rd traffic light, (Fossil Creek Blvd.) Turn left, drive approx. 1 ¼ miles, right turn at Sandshell Dr. Club approx. ½ mi. on right. Or...take Geo Bush Turnpike to Hwy 183 West (Airport Frwy) towards Ft.Worth. Drive approx 11 miles, transition to 820 West and drive another 6 miles to I-35<u>W</u>. At I-35W drive north, and take the 1st exit (Western Center Blvd). Take the 1st quick exit at Sandshell Dr. (Chili's Rest. on right) Course entrance .2 miles on left.

FACTS FROM AUGUSTA....



Under the # 12 green (the middle of Amen Corner), is a series of pipes that are used to heat the green in winter and cool it in the

sweltering Augusta summer. Heated or cooled water is sent through the pipes, which in turn heats or cools the green. The reason for this system is to promote root growth and prevent diseases of the grass on the green. Lamps that simulate sunlight are also used at night in the winter to help the grass stay healthy.

PACE OF PLAY...

In the next two newsletters's the topic of Pace of Play will be addressed in hopes of reducing our rounds of golf to the recommended 4 hrs & 20 minutes.

Fifteen year member, **Ken Wagner** has done extensive research into this subject and offers suggestions to all NTSGA members:

First, all members must have a genuine desire to improve the pace of play. We have developed our own method of play through the years and certain habits are hard to change. However, we are asking you to view these suggestions with an open mind and make a willing effort to increase the pace of play for the whole organization. This article is not intended to tell you how to play; only trying to incorporate some of these suggestions into your personal game to keep play moving around the course. Pace of play will usually be dictated by the slowest foursome(s).

Most of the time on the golf courses is spent on:

- 1) Preparing for and executing the shot.
- 2) Driving/walking to the next shot.
- 3) Leaving the green and driving to the next tee.
- 1) Preparing for and executing the shot:

On the tee...

Leave the driver head cover in the cart basket for the entire round. If you know the yardage, share it with nearby players so they don't have to 'shoot' it, especially on par 3's.

Play ready golf, honor only for eagles and birdies. Cart partners should be the first out of the cart, proceed to the teeing area with club, tee and ball in hand. Limit yourself to only one practice swing, or take a practice swing(s) prior to your turn to hit. Allow both players in the front cart to tee off first, this allows the front cart to proceed as soon as the final tee shot is struck. All players should watch each other's tee shots; not many things slow down play than time spent looking for a ball.

On the green...

Once you mark your ball, begin to read the putt to get an idea which way the putt will break. When "on deck", replace your ball as soon as the previous putter's ball is on the way. If the flag has been pulled, all players who are willing to putt with the flag out, should continue to hole out; the flag can then be replaced for the remaining players to hole out. Leave extra clubs, towels, etc. on the green in the general direction of the cart where they can be picked up when leaving the green.

In the next newsletter, the 2nd and 3rd topic of this subject will be addressed.

PUTTING OUT...

Some members think it is ridiculous that we have to putt 3", 6", 10", etc. putts and they are not considered "gimme putts". Perhaps a little background will temper this topic. A few years ago 18" putts were considered "gimme putts". All members had their putter marked with tape at the 18" mark by one of the organization Directors. Laying the putter on the ground measuring the length of the putt, any ball touching the tape was considered a gimme. Then it got out of hand! Soon there were 20", 24", and 36" putts being given by gratuitous partners.

For the most part, the organization adheres to USGA standards with the exception of a few rules that have been adopted by NTSGA contributing to the social, friendly atmosphere at our tournaments.

Remember, there is money awarded for skins, closest to the pin, two man team competition and flight positions. Many times, 1 single stroke is the difference of winning money and not winning money. The Board of Directors has decided it necessary to continue abiding by the USGA rule of holing all putts.
