KEEP PLAY MOVING: In the interest of preventing slow play:

<u>Flagstick:</u> A good rule of thumb is the first person to putt out should be the one to pick up the flag and replace it in the hole following the final hole out. Then the foursome can move smartly to the carts.

<u>Observe:</u> If it doesn't bother the person hitting the ball, stand behind him and carefully watch the flight of his ball. Not observing the flight of a drive or being aware of your playing partners shot, may be time consuming as you guess where the ball went and begin searching in unknown territory.

DIRECTIONS TO GOLF COURSES...

May 7 <u>Bear Creek</u> (DFW Airport) 972-456-3200; 3500 Bear Creek Ct. Course is located on the southwest corner of DFW Airport. Drive the George Bush Turnpike south, towards Arlington. Prior to Hwy 183, exit at Walnut Hill Ln. Turn right. At 2nd traffic light (Airfield Dr.) turn left. Drive 2.3 miles passing 4 traffic lights and overtop of the Airport spine road. Course entrance on left before the 5th traffic light.

May 14 <u>Bridlewood</u> (Flower Mound) 972-355-4800; 4000 W. Windsor Dr. Proceed north on I-35E, exit at FM1171/Main St. (Lewisville). Turn left (west), drive 5 ½ miles, right turn at Bridlewood Blvd. At 1st stop sign, turn right, course entrance on left.

May 21 <u>Watters Creek</u> (Allen) 972-517-7777; 7201 Chase Oaks Blvd. Drive I-75 (Central Expwy). Exit at Legacy Dr., turn west. At 3rd traffic light, (Chase Oaks Blvd) turn right. Course ½ mile on left.

May 28 <u>Country View</u> (Lancaster) 972-227-0995; 240 W. Belt Line Rd. Drive I-35E south, thru downtown Dallas. Continue 7 miles past Reunion Tower, exit at Belt Line Road, turn left, drive 4 miles, course entrance on right.

SCORECARDS: It is the responsibility of one member of each foursome to deliver the completed scorecard to the Scoring Committee upon completion of the round. It must be signed by the scorekeeper and attested/signed by another member of the foursome. If no scorecard is received by the Scoring Committee, the foursome will be disqualified. Recently, a member was halfway home before he realized the scorecard was still in his pocket. He hurriedly returned to the course to turn in the card. It is not the responsibility of the Scoring Committee to dumpster dive for a missing scorecard or make phone calls to inform the foursome that their scorecard has yet to be received.

Sometimes the entered score is 6 and should be a 5, so the scorekeeper enters a darkened 5 over the 6, or changes a 3 to a 4 by a darkened 4 over the 3. The Scoring Committee should not have to decipher the correct score...surely one member of the foursome has a pencil with an eraser, so the incorrect score can be erased and the correct score legibly written. Attention to this small detail would be appreciated.

2025 MASTERS POOL...

The 2025 Masters tournament got underway with beautiful weather conditions

including crystal blue skies, sunshine and light winds. The overwhelming favorite of all the NTSGA members' selections was the worlds #1 player, Scottie Scheffler. Other popular picks included Bryson DeChambeau, Colin Morikawa, Ludvig Aberg, Rory McIlroy and Xander Schauffele. Thirty selections were for Scheffler, but the key was selecting the correct combo player to



pair up with Scottie. Ludvig Aberg, Corey Conners and Scheffler completed their first rounds at 4 under par; however, all trailed the leader 44 year old Justin Rose. Rose recorded a sparkling 7 under 65 to lead the Masters field after Round 1. NTSGA member **Joe Bob Wheeler** was the only member to select Rose as one half of his combo selection.

Justin Rose continued to play error-free golf during Friday's second round, however, closing in on his lead were Bryson DeChambeau, Rory McIlroy and Corey Conners. Sadly, 14 NTSGA selections would not be in contention during the weekend as 7 selected players missed the cut after the second round including Brooks Koepka, Cam Smith, Sergio Garcia, Will Zalatoris and Tony Finau.

Round 3 began with Justin Rose still on top by only a single shot over Bryson DeChambeau. Then from 3rd place, Rory McIlroy roared to the top spot by setting a Masters record, carding 6 straight "3's" to begin his Saturday round. This excited 28 NTSGA members as McIlroy was 1/2 of their combo selections. These members were hopeful that they had selected the correct combination to win this year's Masters Pool. Weather conditions remained favorable as many birdies were made by this years' competitors. McIlroy stayed in contention by hitting quality shots, but was being chased by Bryson DeChambeau hitting booming drives and sinking long putts. At the conclusion of the 3rd round McIlroy led the field by 2 strokes over DeChambeau, 4 strokes over Conners and 6 strokes over Aberg and Patrick Reed. Excitement was at a peak at the NTSGA households of Mike Vestal, Dan Bertschi, Gene Lindsey, Brad Mink, LeRoy Worm and Frank Smith as their selections for this year's Masters Pool were near the top of all the selections. Sunday's final round promised to be thrilling as 8 players were within 7 strokes of the lead including defending champion Scottie Scheffler. McIlroy stumbled out of the gate and by the 3rd hole DeChambeau had a 1 stroke lead. Scheffler and Aberg were playing good golf, but at the turn, McIlroy led by 4 strokes. His lead quickly disappeared when he double bogeyed 13. Justin Rose finished his round 4 groups ahead of DeChambeau and McIlroy and waited near the clubhouse for the final group to finish. McIlroy missed a short putt on 18 forcing a sudden death playoff with Justin Rose. He made a clutch birdie putt on the first playoff hole in front of a huge assemblage of Masters patrons and gorgeous Augusta weather to win the 89th playing of the Masters Tournament. Rory now joins the elite field of 5 other golfers who have won the Career Grand Slam.

HOLE-IN-ONE: JIM SHREWSBURY



The second Hole-In-One of 2025 was recorded by **Jim Shrewsbury** at Bridlewood Golf Club. Jim aced Hole #8, measuring 137 yds. on Mar. 5, using his 7-iron. Witnessing Jim's great shot were playing partners **Rob Bennett** and brothers **Bob and David Bruner**. This is the 4th time Hole #8 at Bridlewood has been aced by an NTSGA golfer since 1978. This was also the 4th Hole-in-One made by Jim during his golfing career.

Jim grew up in Pittsburgh, PA attending local schools. Following high school graduation, Jim entered the US Air Force serving proudly for 4 years. He attended Mechanic Technical training in Denver followed by 3 ½ years attached to Edwards AFB in Edwards, California, east of Los Angeles. Edwards is the Headquarters for the Air Force Test Pilot School and the Air Force Operations Test & Evaluation Center. Jim's aviation mechanical training led him to an assignment at the Edwards AFB Maintenance Dept. in support of the SR-71, F-15, F-22, B-52, C-130 and T38 aircraft. Following Jim's Air Force enlistment, he graduated from the Pittsburgh Institute of Aeronautics and was hired by USAir/American Airlines serving as a commercial aviation maintenance technician culminating in a 42 year career as an Aviation Mechanic.

FUNNY:

In the 16th and 17th centuries everything was transported by ship. Manure was used as fertilizer (this was before the invention of commercial fertilizers), and large shipments of manure was quite common. It was shipped dry because in that form it weighted much less than when wet. However, while at sea, water would enter the hold of the ship and come in contact with the manure. Not only did the manure become heavier but the chemical process of fermentation began, which in turn, produced methane gas. With the manure being stowed in bundles below decks you can see what could, and often did occur. Methane gas would begin to build up and the first time a sailor, carrying a lantern, would go below decks at night to check on the lode...**KA-BOOM**!

Several ships were lost in this manner before the cause was determined. Once determined, the bundles of manure were stamped "Stow High In Transit," which meant the crew had to stow the manure high enough so that any water that entered the hold would not come in contact with the volatile cargo and initiate the fermentation process creating the methane gas condition.

Thus evolved the term "SHIT" (Stow High In Transit), which has come down through the centuries and is in common use to this day.

You probably did not know the true history of this word...neither did I. I always thought it was a golf term!!
